On December 29 we welcomed the first family chosen to come to Wausau from Afghanistan. A dedicated team from our church is collaborating with a team from First Presbyterian as the "First Co-sponsorship Team", in tribute to our shared names and the honor of helping Wausau's first Afghan family resettle here. They have six children between 3-16 years old, and they are all delightful, eager to learn, and have bright futures ahead. The mother, Bibi, is an amazing cook and seamstress. She is starting a small business making aprons and other sewing crafts.


The father, Matie, was a tribal leader in the Helmand Province. The name of their town translates from Pashto to English as "Little America". As an English-speaking businessman and leader, he was the first in his region to approach the US Marine Corps and offer his help. Using his entrepreneurial skills, he led his town to understand and trust the US troops as they worked with the community to build an infrastructure of roads, schools, clinics, and businesses.

A week after their arrival, Matie met with a reporter from Up North News at our church. At first, he declined the possibility of being interviewed in the sanctuary, expressing great respect for it as a holy place. I explained to him that what makes a place holy is wherever God's grace, peace, justice, love, and truth are lived out. Because he was there to share his story of seeking and living those things, he was welcome to be in our sanctuary. He gratefully chose to be interviewed in the sanctuary as he held his prayer beads and shared his quest for freedom and peace for all people.

After the article and pictures of him were published, it quickly created controversy for people back in Afghanistan. He is well-known there, and some were jealous or upset that he had left them to come to the US and wondered why as a Muslim he would be inside a church. A gathering of Muslim clerics from around Afghanistan was convened to decide whether or not Matie was honoring their faith by being in our church. After studying and discussing their Scriptures, they determined that yes, he was acting consistent with their faith, and that nothing in the Koran said Muslims couldn't be in a church. The *fatwa* (Islamic ruling) declared that when Muslims and Christians are working to bring peace, we are like two hands on a body. They decided it is indeed good to be, pray, and talk together in each other's holy spaces. I think we can all say "Amen" to that.

Dear Pivet Scholarship Committee,

I hope this letter finds you all doing well and in good health. I'm writing to you again to express my gratitude for your continued support of my education via the Pivet Scholarship. I also wanted to provide another update on how my studies went this year. This past fall, I completed the first semester of my junior year at the University of Minnesota. During this last semester, I had my first semester of student-teaching part time while also taking classes. For student teaching I was placed in a Kindergarten classroom at a school just outside of downtown Minneapolis. Given I only had experience working with 2nd through 5th grade before this semester, I was apprehensive about being placed with Kindergarten. Despite this original anxiety, I found that the whole experience challenged me to grow as a person and educator. Over the semester, I learned a lot about teaching, lesson planning for short attention spans, and how to find common ground with, surprisingly brilliant, 5 year old's.

I also saw a lot of the difficult, unspoken side of education. Our school had many students who showed up hungry, tired, or were battling a host of other obstacles at home. Directly correlated to this, we had outbursts, long periods of unexplained absences, and behavioral issues that made teaching difficult. Despite these difficult moments, our classroom overcame a lot and made a ton of progress. Seeing these students come to associate school as a safe space, reaffirmed why I am passionate about my major. It also reminded me that there is so much more to teaching than test scores or mandates, but more importantly, ensuring students feel heard, taken care of, and valued.

Just like how a school can be a safe-space and beacon of hope, I thank you for continuing to provide the same to those in need in Wausau. The programs that FUMC aids or leads have an immense positive impact on our community. In addition to thanking you again for your support of my education, I thank you for your diligence in caring for the community of Wausau.
