Dear First UMC Family of Faith,

On Sunday, December 19 we had an historic church-wide vote on the direction of our church. Through the Missional Church Consultative Initiative (MCCI), we were given six "prescriptions" to renew our church and mission. With 93.6% of full members voting "yes" (substantially above the requisite 75%), we are prayerfully and faithfully moving into a new season as a church.

Even though I fully support pursuing the prescriptions, I also understand the 6.4% of people who couldn't vote "Yes". I feel the fatigue. I know the disappointment of past programs and long-range planning sessions. I understand the tight pressure on our time and finances. If you need to rest and make sure our church isn't on a wild goose chase, I get it.

For everyone, both the enthused and the uncertain, it bears repeating: everything must be rooted in prayer, grace, and truth. I am the chief of sinners when it comes to running with a good idea and intentions, only to realize that I didn't really take it all to God in prayer. It's reassuring to know that these prescriptions are all born out of several years of praying, holy conversations, self-reflection, and a realistic awareness of the needs of our church and community. That said, we must continue to find our strength and path through the power of prayer.

We'll be getting free coaching in a variety of ways to help renew our church. The first three prescriptions focus on preparing ourselves. The first is *Preparing Our Welcome*, by making both our building friendlier and more understandable to guests. The second is *Preparing Our Administrative Infrastructure*, by providing an executive leadership coach for me and a finance management coach for Martie in her bookkeeping role. The third is *Preparing Ourselves in Faith Formation* which will bring our church together to learn through cohesive sermon series and Bible studies/small groups for all ages focusing on relevant topics twice a year.

The other three prescriptions focus on reaching and serving the community. The first is *Dreaming Forward: Building Usage*, which will help ensure we're strong stewards of the space in our building and we continue to have a big missional impact for the good of our community. The second is *Telling Our Story to the Community* which helps us get the word out online, in the media, and in our internal communications about how we're serving the community and invite others to join us. The final prescription is something tentatively called *Wausau Worldchangers*, an initiative of raising up a new generation of young leaders who want to change our community for good and God's glory. Let us all commit to serving and loving God and our community in 2022 and beyond!

One of the ministries of our church and one of the ways that we minister in partner-


ship with others, is by serving a free meal open to all in the Wausau community on the 5th Sunday of the month at the First Presbyterian Church.



Random Thoughts by Mike Zahn Trusting God

Note: I wrote this about 20 years ago and found it recently as I was going through papers. "But blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord." Jeremiah 17:7

That morning the sermon was on the subject of trusting God. Little did I realize how valuable that would prove to be later in the day!

Cross-country skiing alone late that afternoon I was startled to find a dead-end where I thought the trail would continue back to my starting point. The sun was beginning to set as I realized I could never get back before dark if I just backtracked on my original course. Panic began to set in until I remembered the words of that sermon. God was not going to desert me—He would make sure I found my way back if I were willing to trust Him.

I felt my panic subside as a sense of determination took its place. Assessing the situation, I made a few quick decisions and boldly went forward into uncharted territory. I kept telling myself to trust God as He led me along a road past the county landfill until that also ended. Now as daylight faded I had to trust once again. Venturing into virgin snow with inexplicable confidence, I hoped and believed that God was leading me in the direction of my car. Before long my newly blazed trail through the woods connected me to the original trail right near where I had started!

It was almost completely dark when I got back to the car, thankful that I had gone to church that morning to hear a message I could put into practice so promptly.

Personal Life Update from Pastor Rebecca

When the MCCI Prescriptions were first revealed at the end of November, I immediately started thinking about how to apply each of them. The third one, focusing on having church-wide sermon series and corresponding Bible studies/small groups, got me thinking about which aspects of faith would be most meaningful for our congregation to explore. The topic of Forgiveness soon rose to the top of my list. As a pastor, I've seen a lot of confusion and pain surrounding the *what* and *how* of forgiveness. People often assume forgiveness includes trust and reconciliation, and I knew that would be something I'd need to teach about in-depth. Little did I know what I would have to go through in order to be more personally qualified to understand forgiveness.

In early December I made some very painful discoveries about my marriage. We have been going to counseling, both together and individually, to try to heal. It has become clear that trust cannot be restored, and our marriage is not able to be reconciled. However, I have hope that I can personally find healing and wish the same for him. We are both committed to the well-being of our children and choose to treat each other respectfully. I'm not sharing more than necessary for the sake of our children and so James can rebuild his life in a healthy way. It may take me a while to fully forgive and find healing, but it's all part of my responsibility as a Christian and a pastor. God will redeem this difficult personal experience and possibly prepare me to lead our congregation through a deeper understanding of forgiveness. Thank you for respecting our privacy, and most of all, for your prayers as we all heal.
