


Dear First Wausau Family and Friends,



Because about 10-15% of Wisconsin UM churches are deciding to disaffiliate and leave our connection with their property, our innovative request for the Conference's blessing to give and repurpose our property is understandably met with confusion and skepticism. Thankfully, we have received excellent advice through our MCCI Building Repurpose Coach, Bishop Ken Carter of the Florida and North Carolina Conferences, and the CEO of the Wesley Community Development Council in North Carolina, Joel Gilland. Learn more at wesleycdc.com for examples of innovative ways other United Methodist properties are being redeveloped in compliance with the Trust Clause and Book of Discipline.

There are two significant changes to our proposal based on advice from the Wesley CDC. The first is that rather than an assortment of percentages and reimbursements for our portion of utilities and other expenses, we would pay a flat rate of about \$2.25/sq. ft./year with up to a 2% increase per year. On 17,000 sq. ft. we plan to exclusively use, we would pay \$38,250/year to cover our portion of building use. This would save us about \$60,000 on our annual budget, which is necessary to slow the rapid bleeding from our endowment.

The major change suggested by the Wesley CDC, and also approved by Tim Parker and leaders at the Community Foundation of North Central WI, is that rather than donate our actual property, we would donate a renewable 99-year, \$1/year lease of our entire property to the CF. Everything else would stay the same, including our free, exclusive use of 17,000 sq. ft. plus the Chapel, Parlor, Kitchen, and Fellowship Hall on Sundays. All the needed improvements, renovations, and repairs would still be paid for by the CF. This removes any potential complications with the Trust Clause, ensures our long-term interests in the building, and also makes it simpler for the CF.

Pending the timely blessing of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that we proposed to the Cabinet, the Chancellor, and the District Board of Building and Location on January 6, we will have a Church Conference vote at 11 am on February 12. If any of them are not ready to approve this by the end of January, we will postpone the vote so that all members will receive a copy of the MOU within 10 days of the vote as required by the Book of Discipline.




Sasha's Generosity

Scott tells a story about when his church group visited Russia and he met a ten-year-old Russian orphan named Sasha who, for some reason, latched on to him. Sasha took Scott by the arm and led him through the orphanage, showing off his room and the place he ate meals. All the while Sasha's eyes were filled with joy and laughter. In spite of the fact that Scott spoke little Russian, and Sasha spoke no English, they connected. As the church group prepared to depart, Sasha sat beside Scott, pulled a silver ring from his finger, and held it out for Scott to take. His eyes filled with tears and Scott spoke the only Russian word I knew — "Nyet, nyet." (No, no.) This child, who had nothing in the world to call his own except this ring, desperately wanted to give this ring to him. When asked why Sasha wanted to give his only possession away, Sasha responded through an interpreter, "Because I am so thankful Scott came." For Sasha, abundant joy, extreme poverty, and a heart filled with gratitude overflowed in a wealth of generosity.

For many of us who have so much, we want more. We are not thankful for what we have and always look for the "something more." And truth be told, it's never enough. What would happen if, by God's grace, our desire to gain more and have more could be transformed by gratitude into a heartfelt desire to give more? What would happen if in a spirit of gratitude, we spent as much time figuring out ways to give as we spend figuring out how to earn, have, and keep? Can you recall a time when you were truly thankful despite negative circumstances? Can you recall a time when someone who could least afford it gave you a generous gift? What was it like? How did you respond?
