
## NOVEMBER 2022





Dear First UMC Family of Faith,

I have been learning many things about our congregation. As we celebrate our 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this year, here are a few interesting parts of our history that can inspire our faith.

- First UMC is not only the first Methodist church, but the first church of any type in Wausau (then called Big Bull Falls). It started with outdoor revival services on what was called Jim Moore's Island (now a peninsula near the 6<sup>th</sup> St. boat launch) led by a Methodist Evangelist named Rev. Brown. There were only five women living in town.
- We have worshiped God in nine buildings, starting in a red school house and then in the Sons of Temperance Hall. The first dedicated church building and parsonage were built in 1859 on the corner of N. 2<sup>nd</sup> and Grant Streets, but they both burned in fires in 1868/9. They were both rebuilt by 1872 in the same location, when Big Bull Falls was renamed Wausau. They quickly out grew that building and built a Gothic-style church in 1884. Twenty years later, they had to construct an even larger Gothic-style church, which served the congregation from 1904-1958 on the corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and Franklin. After constructing and worshipping in our current Educational Unit from 1959-1966, the Sanctuary was dedicated in 1967 where we have been gathering to worship for the past 55 years.
- Our congregation has a history of being forward-thinking pioneers and educators. In 1868 there were nine Sunday School teachers with sixty children and twenty adults. In 1906 there were 342 church members but 543 people attending Sunday School. By 1910, those numbers swelled to 450 members and 960 people in Sunday School. When the current Sanctuary was dedicated in 1967, there were 1,050 members and about 100 teachers, officers, and staff for all of the Sunday School students.
- In 1917 the Alexander family commissioned an Italian artist, Louis Amorosi, to depict Christ praying over Jerusalem on a large canvas mural that filled a large Gothic arch in the 1904 building. Amorosi also painted a large mural in Wausau High School. The church redecorating chairperson and owner of a paint and wallpaper store, William Zimmer, posed as Jesus for the artist on Rib Mountain overlooking the growing town. The large mural was carefully moved to become the focal point of the Chapel in 1959.
- In 1935 First UMC welcomed their first female pastor and former missionary, Rev. Minnie Cliff. I am honored to follow Pastor Minnie's trailblazing as your eighth female pastor.

The January 31, 1960 dedication booklet for the new building summarized this congregation in a way that I hope we continue to grow:

"Wausau's oldest church, it has served at the heart of the city since 1847. Presenting a warm and vital faith which exalts Jesus Christ as Lord of all life, it welcomes all people into its fellowship, regardless of race or station. Offering an historically free pulpit with a prophetic message, its gospel relates Christ to all aspects of personal and social living. Concerned with the total needs of free men [sic], it encourages a responsible exercise of freedom by individuals according to their own consciences."






We grieve this month at the loss of:

## Overview of First UMC Building Issues and Proposed Donation

### Reality of our Membership and Budget

2002: 650 members, average worship attendance of 247, and operating budget of \$524K. Members gave an average of \$64/month to support ministries.

2012: 473 members with an average worship attendance of 165 people. Members gave an average of

\$74/month to cover a budget of \$420K.

 2022: 225 members, average worship attendance of 80 (including online), and operating budget of \$347K. To cover the budget, members would need to give an average of \$129/month per person, rather than the \$99/month per person that is the current average.

### Reality of our Building and Needed Improvements

The Sanctuary wing is 55 years old, and the rest of the building is 63 years old.

· Roof and gutters for Sanctuary, Wesley room, drive-thru, offices & conference room, and several

entrances need to be replaced very soon. \$220,000+

Twelve bathrooms are original and need to be completely gutted and remodeled with new fixtures to ensure accessibility, lower water waste and repair bills, and show hospitality. No estimate due to uncertain future usage/needs, but likely \$200,000+

Internet wiring needed for upper and lower levels and the BK Smith room/nursery/front offices/bell room area. It would be significantly less expensive to also remove and replace all the current ceilings and light fixtures instead of the high labor costs of drilling, fishing cables, and making it aesthetically pleasing. No estimate, but likely \$100,000+

Necessary organ repairs of \$66,400 was recently approved by Trustees.

- Sanctuary lighting needs to be replaced due to extensively damaged wiring and sockets. Cost will be \$100,000-\$150,000, but energy savings from LED bulbs offsets the cost.
- 19.7 KW Solar installation on the roof estimated at \$58,000. Energy savings would pay for itself within an estimated 7-10 years.

Exterior brick and concrete repairs estimated at \$100,000+

This totals about \$900,000 in needed improvements if we want to retain ownership and manage the space. This would cost \$4,000 in average donations from every member, in addition to an average of \$1,548 needed each year from each member toward the budget.

### Proposed Financial Responsibilities:

 If we donate our building to the Community Foundation (CF), they will offer us a free, renewable 100-year lease on the space we would exclusively use.


Of the building improvements listed above, the CF would pay for all exterior and most interior expenses.

Exceptions would be for organ repairs and likely sanctuary lighting.

The CF would be responsible for all interior and exterior maintenance. First UMC would pay a percentage of the utility bills based on space and usage and for cleaning our exclusive space.

The CF would also pay to remodel the nursery into a new office area for our staff, and the BK Smith room into a new nursery, elementary room, and multi-purpose meeting room.

## Possible Floor Plan to Remodel BK Smith & Nursery Areas



### Proposed First UMC-only Space Use:

- In addition to the remodeled and repurposed BKS/Nursery area, the current PNC, CCC, area would be our space to continue those missions.
- The "Worship Entrance" would be our primary door. The concrete closet in that entrance would be removed to open the space, and a door would be added to access the new office area. The "Main Entrance" would be used primarily for other non-profits to access the building from the parking lot.
- The Bell room would continue in that function, with choir music file cabinets added.
- The Choir room would be converted into a Youth/Scout/Game room.

#### Proposed Shared Spaces:

- The Parlor, Kitchen, Fellowship Hall, Chapel, and halls/bathrooms near those areas would be spaces shared by non-profits and our congregation. They would be reserved equitably and rented economically through the CF. We would rent the Chapel, Parlor, and Kitchen on Sunday mornings, and the Kitchen and/or Fellowship Hall for special events.
- Because the Chapel would have multiple uses, it is likely that the pews would be replaced with chairs, and
  the communion railing would possibly be removed. The 1917 mural of Jesus praying on the mountain
  would remain, with other non-profits that wish to use the room having the option of temporarily covering it
  if they desire.

Congregational feedback will help us work out optimal logistics with the Community Foundation and Wisconsin Annual Conference. We hope to vote on the final proposal early next year, open to all fully confirmed members of First UMC of Wausau.

### Accomplish the Impossible

God is looking for people through whom He can do the impossible - what a pity that we plan only the things we can do by ourselves." - A.W. Tozer

I recently ran across a story that highlights the power of partnership. In the latter part of the nineteenth century, when the Methodist church was holding its denominational convention, one leader stood up and shared his vision both for the church and society at large. He told the ministers and evangelists how he believed someday men would fly from place to place instead of merely traveling on horseback. But it was a concept too outlandish for many members of his audience to handle.

One minister, Bishop Wright, stood up and angrily protested, "Heresy!" he shouted. "Flight is reserved for the angels!" He went on to elaborate that if God had intended for man to fly, God would have given him wings. Clearly the bishop was unable to envision what the speaker was predicting.

When Bishop Wright finished his brief protest, he gathered up his two sons, Orville and Wilbur, and left the auditorium.

That's right. His sons were Orville and Wilbur Wright. And several years later, on December 17, 1903, those two sons did what their father called impossible. They made four flights that day. The first lasted only 12 seconds, but the fourth lasted 59 seconds and took them 852 feet.

Soon the Wright brothers had built the first practical airplane, the Flyer III, and by 1908, the brothers had demonstrated an improved model in France that flew 60 miles in less than two hours.

The brothers partnered together to accomplish the impossible - and in the process, they changed the world.
