Dear First UMC Family of Faith,

We've all faced a lot of uncertainties together in the year I've been here. We thought we were close to the "Covid Clear", only to have the Delta variant take us several steps back. We've tried to understand the risks and respond accordingly with better and balanced safety precautions. On a personal level, I'm deeply grateful for your prayers and support as I navigated a couple of weeks recently not knowing whether a mass was cancerous or not. It is a great relief to have the softball-sized cyst now gone and know there is no cancer!

As I've recovered and begun to prepare our church for a full return to ministry this fall, we find ourselves wrestling with uncertainties again. Will it be safe to start choir and bell rehearsals and share these ministries in Sunday worship? Can we safely share meals on Wednesday evenings? Is it wise to begin Sunday School for our children and youth? I'm so proud of our 12+ year-olds who have all been vaccinated, but also protective of our younger children who are unable to be vaccinated.

In consulting with the Marathon County Health Department and our leaders and volunteers, we've decided to postpone our Wednesday night meals until COVID cases drop to a safer level. In the meantime, it has been deemed relatively safe to have Bell Choir rehearsals and Confirmation Class at 6pm, and Adult Choir rehearsals at 7pm in the Sanctuary. In addition, we will have Sunday School for all ages at 9 am; children, youth, and adult.

Uncertainties like these are vexing for personalities like mine who love to make and stick to plans. Then I feel a nudge by the Holy Spirit, who reminds me that these are "First World Problems". We have the blessings of safe vaccines, masks, food and supply pick-up and delivery services, and online options for nearly everything in life and faith. It's not what we're used to, and it's not always easy or convenient or comfortable, but that's exactly how we grow in faith. Our comfort, assumptions, and conveniences are challenged, and we're offered grace from God to find spiritual strength and growth.

Let's praise God for the ways we can meet and worship together. Continue to encourage one another as we persevere through frustrations, and trust that God is using this to deepen our faith, hope, and love.

Refugee Resettlement Update

It has been heartwrenching for all of us to watch the evacuations of thousands of Afghan refugees along with Americans. No matter what our opinions are regarding the time and money the US spent over there the past 20 years, we can agree that God is calling us to honor our commitment to provide safe refuge for Afghans who risked their lives to help our troops and country as translators, guards, guides, educators, etc.

Just two weeks before Kabul fell and mass evacuations began, the US Dept. of State told the Immigration Directors of every state that all new refugee resettlement sites (like Wausau) would have a 6 month period starting in October 2021 to build infrastructure in our community to ensure long-term success in welcoming and retaining refugees. That means we'd need to wait **until April 2022** before our first refugees would come. I certainly understand and support the rationale, but also wrestle with the need for humanitarian urgency.

Then on Aug. 25, I got an urgent call to join an emergency zoom meeting with 50 leaders and site directors from across the country who work for the ECDC resettlement agency. The US State Dept. needed urgent input as to how many of our Afghan allies could be resettled by all nine national resettlement agencies within the next 3-6 weeks. They didn't know if Wausau (and another new site in VT) would be needed to step up quickly, but the Immigration Director in WI said that I should move forward with finding out how many households (with an average of 5 people) Wausau could sponsor on short notice. The Zoom meeting ended at 4:30 pm, and the US Dept. of State needed to get a commitment from each city by 1 pm the next day.

I quickly emailed this update and urgent request to the growing list of city and faith leaders I've gotten to know. By 8 am, there were already 12 sponsorship groups committing to raise \$1500-3500 (depending on family size), find and furnish an apartment/home, and work to help refugee families get assimilated in all aspects of work, school, health, language, and culture. However, I also got an email early that morning explaining that the Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration (a division of the US State Dept.) decided they did NOT need new sites like Wausau to be part of the Afghan Ally program after all. Apparently, all the existing agencies and sites had committed to enough capacity to resettle our Afghan Allies, so that is reassuring.

After emailing leaders once again with this news, someone wisely replied, "That was a successful fire drill!". It certainly was, as it showed everyone the ability our churches and city have to quickly respond with compassion and commitment. It also brought forward many individuals with a variety of talents and time who are eager to help build our infrastructure. I've been the de facto coordinator and have been eager to pass on these responsibilities to a new Site Director once they're hired. One person I met through this "fire drill" is Gwen Paul, who was raised in Wausau and moved away for college and a career working in ministry with refugees in Burundi, the Congo, and most recently Lancaster, PA. She and her husband moved back to Wausau this spring, knowing they still had a call to work with refugees and not understanding why God was calling them back to a city where there were no refugees to resettle. After sharing the story of how and when this all got started (at the same time they moved here), she offered to become the interim coordinator until the new Site Director is hired and trained. Her gifts and experience are a great blessing and relief to me as I pass her the baton, and will really help prepare Wausau in a way that I didn't have the time or knowledge to do.

It's important that we stay flexible yet prepared throughout this process. We don't know for sure which country we'll be getting refugees from, but we can pray and trust God to send us people from a culture that will help strengthen everyone in various ways. We don't know for sure when they'll come, but we can pray and trust God to provide us with the right housing, furnishings, and resources needed to help a family feel welcomed and loved. Please join with me in praying for refugees awaiting safe placement, for our government to make wise decisions for the timing and placement of refugees, for ECDC to establish Wausau as a strong resettlement site, for Gwen Paul and all the gifted and committed leaders who have emerged, and for our community to truly understand and welcome refugees with compassion and connection.

Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty...






We grieve this month at the loss of our long time church members:

Stewardship-Connecting Vision and Generosity September 2021

Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Matthew 7:7-8

After serving my first local church part-time as a college student for two years, I had just finished leading my last worship service and was greeting folks at the door. One gentleman shook my hand and said, "Jason, thank you for being our pastor. I think one of the things I liked about you the most is that you never talked about money."

I've thought about his statement many times over the years. I've also heard the same sentiment repeated by both laity and clergy in many ways. We tend to see financial stewardship and money as a "necessary evil." It's something we must deal with to get to real ministry.

In his short book, A Spirituality of Fundraising, Henri Nouwen challenges this view of money and stewardship (which he calls fundraising). He writes: Fundraising is, first and foremost, a form of ministry. It is a way of announcing our vision and inviting other people into our mission. Fundraising is proclaiming what we believe in such a way that we offer other people an opportunity to participate with us in our vision and mission. We are declaring, 'We have a vision that is amazing and exciting. We are inviting you to invest yourself through the resources that God has given you – your energy, your prayers, and your money – in this work to which God has called us.

I wonder what vision God has entrusted to you and your congregation that you can invite others to be a part of through their prayers, their presence, their service, their witness, and their gifts.
